

Death of HM The Queen

Statement issued by Governor Nigel Phillips

Today, Thursday 08 September 2022, at 18:30 GMT, Buckingham Palace announced that Her Majesty The Queen had died peacefully at Balmoral.

In response to the announcement, Governor Nigel Philips issued the following personal statement:

"On behalf of the communities of St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha, we would like to express our profound sorrow at the news of the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II.

As proud members of the British family, and with a long tradition of loyalty, we feel a strong connection to The Queen. Her loss will be keenly felt throughout our communities.

The community of St Helena recalls with fondness The Queen's visit here as a young Princess, alongside her father King George VI.

The Queen's leadership, especially during times of adversity, was unparalleled and an inspiration to us all. Her tireless work for Her people will never be forgotten. We send our deepest condolences to His Majesty The King and the Royal Family.

The territory will now enter a period of national mourning until 08:00 on the day after The Queen's funeral.

A book of condolence will be opened in Georgetown from 09:00 on 09 September, and will be available for members of the public in the office next to the Administrator's Office.

God save The King."

Tribute to Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II

08 September 2022



Peace I leave with you; my peace I give you. I do not give to you as the world gives.

Do not let your hearts be troubled and do not be afraid. [John 14:27]

It is with the greatest sorrow and sadness that we mourn the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. After a long life of faith, duty and service, a great light has gone out.

Her Majesty was an extraordinary person, who lived an extraordinary life: a constant presence and example for each of us, guiding and serving us all for as long as any of us can remember.

Throughout her reign, and seven decades of extraordinary change and challenge, Her Majesty was the epitome of duty, stability, wisdom and grace.

Her Majesty loved the Commonwealth, and the Commonwealth loved her. During her reign she travelled more than any monarch in history, visiting every part of our family of nations. Between 1971 and 2018, she missed only one Heads of Government Meeting. Her devotion to duty was only matched by her skill as Head of the Commonwealth of Nations, always a generous host and consummate diplomat.

In Her Majesty's final Commonwealth Day message, she described our family of nations as "a modern, vibrant and connected Commonwealth that combines a wealth of history and tradition with the great social, cultural and technological advances of our time. That the Commonwealth stands ever taller is a credit to all who have been involved."

The growth and vibrancy of our modern Commonwealth is a credit to her and testament to her dedication, wisdom and leadership.

In 1947, before she ascended to the throne, she stated that "My whole life, whether it be long or short, will be devoted in service."

Her Majesty honoured that promise.

In 1953 Her Majesty defined our family of nations as one which "bears no resemblance to the empires of the past. It is an entirely new conception, built on the highest qualities of the spirit of man: friendship, loyalty and the desire for freedom and peace. To that new conception of an equal partnership of nations and races I shall give myself heart and soul every day of my life."

Her Majesty's vision for the Commonwealth at the beginning of her reign has been fulfilled, fueled by her dedication and commitment. Inspired by her life of duty and service, the responsibility to ensure her vision endures is one we all now share.

As the sixth Secretary-General of the Commonwealth, I will always be grateful for her warmth and kindness to me. Our interactions were a delight, and it was wonderful to see her passion and animation whenever discussing anything relating to the Commonwealth. Her long years of interaction and partnership with generations of world leaders and their people, particularly the young, gave her extraordinary insight, which brought ever-more life and meaning to her service.

I will miss her greatly, the Commonwealth will miss her greatly, and the world will miss her greatly. We will never see her like again.

On behalf of the Nations and Citizens of the Commonwealth I express our profound sadness at her passing, our admiration for all that she was, and our enduring gratitude for all that she gave us. We send our prayers, love and heartfelt condolences to the entire Royal Family

Hers was a life of service which will echo through the ages. We will be forever grateful.

Proclamation Issued

Governor proclaims His Majesty in Jamestown

At 10:30 today, in Jamestown St Helena, Governor Nigel Phillips issued a Proclamation proclaiming his Majesty King Charles III in St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha.

The full text of Governor Phillips proclamation was as follows:

"Whereas it has pleased Almighty God to call to His Mercy our late Sovereign Lady Queen Elizabeth the Second of Blessed Glorious Memory, by whose Decease the Crown is solely and rightfully come to The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George, I, Nigel James Phillips, Commander of the Order of the British Empire and the citizens St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha do now hereby with one voice and Consent of Tongue and Heart publish and proclaim that The Prince Charles Philip Arthur George is now, by Death of our late Sovereign of Happy Memory, become our only lawful and rightful Liege Lord Charles the Third, by Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and of His other Realms and Territories, King, Head of the Commonwealth, Defender of the Faith, to whom we do acknowledge all Faith and Obedience with humble Affection; beseeching God by whom Kings and Queens do reign to bless His Majesty with long and happy Years to reign over us."

Proclamation of New Sovereign

Governor to proclaim His Majesty The King On Sunday 11 September

Following her death on Thursday 08 September, official arrangements for mourning Her Late Majesty Queen Elizabeth II, and for the Proclamation of the new Sovereign, His Majesty King Charles III, will be observed as follows.

The Proclamation

The accession of the new Sovereign, His Majesty King Charles III, will be proclaimed at a meeting of the Privy Council at St James's Palace in London on 10 September.

At 10:30 on Sunday 11 September, in a ceremony on the steps of the Courthouse in Jamestown, His Excellency Governor Phillips will proclaim the new Sovereign of St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha.

The public are invited to attend the Governor's proclamation on Sunday 11 September in Jamestown.

Public notice of the Governor's proclamation will subsequently be provided in Ascension by His Honour Administrator Burns.

After the Proclamation

The Governor will depart for the UK on Sunday 11 September to represent Ascension in several official mourning arrangements. The Chief Minister of St Helena will also be travelling to represent St Helena.

Her Late Majesty's coffin will lie in state in Westminster Hall in the Palace of Westminster.

The State Funeral will be held in Westminster Abbey and will be attended by Royal, Realm, Overseas Territory, Commonwealth, and foreign representatives.

The day of the State Funeral will be a public holiday in St Helena, Ascension and Tristan da Cunha. The date of the funeral will be confirmed shortly.

Flag protocol and guidance

All official flags in the territory are being flown at half-mast to mark the period of national mourning.

On Saturday at 09:30, the morning of the Principal Proclamation of the Sovereign by the Privy Council in London, flags will be raised to full-mast. They will remain at full-mast until 12:00 on Sunday, the day after the Principal Proclamation.

Flags will then return to half-mast until 07:00 the day after the State Funeral.

God save The King.

Office of the Administrator 09 September 2022 King Charles III delivered his first address as sovereign Friday, after the death of his mother, Queen Elizabeth II. The following is a transcript of his remarks, as released by the palace.



I speak to you today with feelings of profound sorrow.

Throughout her life, Her Majesty The Queen — my beloved Mother — was an inspiration and example to me and to all my family, and we owe her the most heartfelt debt any family can owe to their mother; for her love, affection, guidance, understanding and example.

Queen Elizabeth's was a life well lived; a promise with destiny kept and she is mourned most deeply in her passing. That promise of lifelong service I renew to you all today. Alongside the personal grief that all my family are feeling, we also share with so many of you in the United Kingdom, in all the countries where the queen was head of state, in the Commonwealth and across the world, a deep sense of gratitude for the more than seventy years in which my mother, as queen, served the people of so many nations.

In 1947, on her 21st birthday, she pledged in a broadcast from Cape Town to the Commonwealth to devote her life, whether it be short or long, to the service of her peoples. That was more than a promise: it was a profound personal commitment which defined her whole life.

She made sacrifices for duty. Her dedication and devotion as Sovereign never wavered, through times of change and progress, through times of joy and celebration, and through times of sadness and loss. In her life of service we saw that abiding love of tradition, together with that fearless embrace of progress, which make us great as Nations. The affection, admiration and respect she inspired became the hallmark of her reign. And, as every member of my family can testify, she combined these qualities with warmth, humor and an unerring ability always to see the best in people.

I pay tribute to my Mother's memory and I honor her life of service. I know that her death brings great sadness to so many of you, and I share that sense of loss, beyond measure, with you all.

When the queen came to the throne, Britain and the world were still coping with the privations and aftermath of the Second World War, and still living by the conventions of earlier times. In the course of the last seventy years we have seen our society become one of many cultures and many faiths. The institutions of the State have changed in turn. But, through all changes and challenges, our nation and the wider family of Realms — of whose talents, traditions and achievements I am so inexpressibly proud — have prospered and flourished. Our values have remained, and must remain, constant.

The role and the duties of Monarchy also remain, as does the Sovereign's particular relationship and responsibility toward the Church of England — the Church in which my own faith is so deeply rooted. In that faith, and the values it inspires, I have been brought up to cherish a sense of duty to others, and to hold in the greatest respect the precious traditions, freedoms and responsibilities of our unique history and our system of parliamentary government.

As the queen herself did with such unswerving devotion, I too now solemnly pledge myself, throughout the remaining time God grants me, to uphold the Constitutional principles at the heart of our nation. And wherever you may live in the United Kingdom, or in the Realms and territories across the world, and whatever may be your background or beliefs, I shall endeavor to serve you with loyalty, respect and love, as I have throughout my life.

My life will, of course, change as I take up my new responsibilities. It will no longer be possible for me to give so much of my time and energies to the charities and issues for which I care so deeply. But I know this important work will go on in the trusted hands of others.

This is also a time of change for my family. I count on the loving help of my darling wife, Camilla. In recognition of her own loyal public service since our marriage seventeen years ago, she becomes my queen consort. I know she will bring to the demands of her new role the steadfast devotion to duty on which I have come to rely so much.

As my Heir, William now assumes the Scottish titles which have meant so much to me. He succeeds me as Duke of Cornwall and takes on the responsibilities for the Duchy of Cornwall which I have undertaken for more than five decades. Today, I am proud to create him Prince of Wales, *Tywysog Cymru*, the country whose title I have been so greatly privileged to bear during so much of my life and duty. With Catherine beside him, our new Prince and Princess of Wales will, I know, continue to inspire and lead our national conversations, helping to bring the marginal to the center ground where vital help can be given.

I want also to express my love for Harry and Meghan as they continue to build their lives overseas. In a little over a week's time we will come together as a nation, as a Commonwealth and indeed a global community, to lay my beloved mother to rest. In our sorrow, let us remember and draw strength from the light of her example.

On behalf of all my family, I can only offer the most sincere and heartfelt thanks for your condolences and support. They mean more to me than I can ever possibly express.

And to my darling Mama, as you begin your last great journey to join my dear late Papa, I want simply to say this: Thank you. Thank you for your love and devotion to our family and to the family of nations you have served so diligently all these years.

May "flights of Angels sing thee to thy rest."



Two Boats Projects Update

Key works completed

Three long awaited projects in Two Boats have now been completed by the Operation and Facilities Directorate. These include the North East Bay Road cattle grid, the Two Boats School cattle grid and the replacement of the Two Boats School playground, a project which also included landscaping work outside of the school. All of these works were carried out by AIG team members in addition to their normal duties.

In addition, further projects are underway or planned for Two Boats in the next few months. These include:

Further work at Two Boats School

The work in and around Two Boats School has enabled associated extra works to be undertaken which are anticipated to be completed within the next two weeks. These include improving the signage and car park at the school's main entrance.

Repair of the Two Boats fence

The completion of the fence repairs has been delayed slightly due to other work commitments, but is it expected that the work will nonetheless be finished within the next two weeks.

Georgetown Road cattle grid

The replacement of this grid will start in January 2023.

Two Boats waste water plant

Ground clearance works started in late August and will progress to site preparations, ready for when the new plant arrives on island in late October.

As the location of the new waste water plant is immediately adjacent to the current one, it is anticipated that there will be no noticeable disruption to the public during these works.

Members of the public, particularly residents of Two Boats, are thanked for their patience during all of the works mentioned above.

Weekly COVID-19 Statistics

Monitoring of community spread continues

On Monday 08 August, Ascension recorded its first case of COVID-19 within the community. Since then, further cases of COVID-19 have been recorded and authorities are monitoring the spread of virus.

In order to ensure the public has a clear picture of infection rates within the territory, weekly infection statistics are being published during the period of transitioning to 'living with COVID-19'.

As of Wednesday 07 September, the total number of positive results from tests conducted by, or registered with, a healthcare worker at one of the three testing sites is as follows:

These figures are based on results of tests conducted at each of these sites. However, the test site may not necessarily reflect the primary accommodation location of the person that tested positive.

Between Thursday 01 September and Wednesday 07 September the following number of daily positive results from tests conducted by, or registered with, a healthcare worker was recorded:

As of Wednesday 07 September, there have been no admissions to Georgetown Hospital due to COVID-19 illness.

All members of the public are encouraged to monitor their own health for signs of possible infection. If you believe you have symptoms consistent with possible COVID-19 infection you should arrange to take a test at your relevant medical facility and follow the guidance in place. Guidance can be found online at www.ascension.gov.ac/public-document/living-with-covid-19 and is available through your employer, local medical clinic and Georgetown Hospital.

If you test positive, you should isolate for five days. After this time you should end your isolation once you feel well. A test is not required to end isolation.

Temporary Dental Clinic Provision


Limited service in operation at Dental Clinic until 08 October

The AIG dentist, Mr Rob Pickering, departed the island on 11 September. As a result, there is currently no dentist available whilst the island awaits the arrival of a locum dentist, who are due to arrive on 08 October.

In the interim the dental clinic will remain open and a dental nurse will be available to provide advice and support to patients. Georgetown Hospital medical staff will also be available to deal with any urgent dental needs. Appointments should be scheduled in the usual manner by calling 66252.

Annual Island-wide Beach Clean

Saturday 22 October

Every year, the community comes together to undertake an island-wide clean-up of beaches important to the biodiversity of Ascension. Every piece of rubbish removed makes our island safer for wildlife and helps us to protect our island's wildlife from the impacts of marine litter and invasive species. .

This year plastic items and fishing lines have been seen in the nests of brown boobies on Letterbox, Galapagos sharks have been seen wrapped in plastic tape and AIG officials collected more than 170 cigarette butts in a single beach clean at North East Bay.

Many of our beaches, such as Dead Man's, Pan Am and Long Beach, have also seen an increase in the number of invasive plant species growing there.

The beach clean takes place ahead of the start of the green turtle nesting season in November. As such, the island-wide beach clean will take place on Saturday 22 October. Removing the weeds and litter that has accumulated on the island's beaches over the last year will give the visiting green turtles the best chance of successfully nesting and ensuring that the hatchlings make it to the sea.

To say thank you for participating, music, food and lots of fun activities for the children will be provided after the event at Turtle Ponds.

More information will be provided closer to the date.


